







Mrs Regan managed the property for nine years before she passed away.



Bland's History and Heritage

West Wyalong/Wyalong

The original occupants of the district were the Wiradjuri people. Explorer John Oxley was the first European to investigate the area in 1817, prophesying that "For want of timber, grass and water it would never be inhabited by civilised man".

Despite this statement, squatters began to settle in 1833, recognising the area's agricultural potential and vast sheep and cattle runs were introduced to the area.

It was not until Joseph Neeld discovered gold in 1893 that a centralised settlement developed. The town of Wyalong was laid out in 1894 to service the new population of up to 10,000. However, a settlement to the west, at the 'Main Camp' had been developed boasting the 'White Tank', the only established water supply. Hence in 1895

West Wyalong was officially laid out. The crooked main street reflects these early days as it follows the original bullock track that curved around trees and gold diggings. The Wyalong fields were one of the most productive gold fields in the state until the 1920s.

Look out for cast bronze information plaques on some historic buildings and the interpretive street panels, that help complete a picture of our rich past.

Gold Mining

Gold mining is still active today in the Bland Shire with Cowal Gold Operations near Lake Cowal.

The mining method used at the gold mine is a conventional load and haul. drill and blast open-pit operation. The processing plant consists of crushing. two stage grinding, sulphide flotation, regrind and carbon-in leach recovery.

The annual gold production is about 240,000 ounces. To date, the mine has produced almost 3 million ounces of gold. The life of the mine is currently approved to 2032.

The Cowal operating team have successfully commenced the Warraga underground exploration space at Cowal Gold Operations.

The Warraga decline had reached 550 metres of lateral development as of 30 June 2019 and is progressing ahead of schedule.

Poppet Head & Neeld's Hut Cooinda Reserve, Neeld Street, Wyalong


The original True Blue Poppet Head was located underneath the motel of that name today. True Blue Motel. The 25 metre mine shaft head was recreated in Cooinda Reserve, near Wyalong. on the town's centenary together with a replica of a miner's hut. The mine was established in 1894 by the Neeld family with a battery and treatment works and ultimately vielded 40 kilograms of gold. A marker located on Central Road (near the industrial area) indicates the location of Frederick Neeld's first mine.

The first bark hut was erected in Wyalong in 1893 in the middle of what is now Neeld Street. After selecting 2,500 acres of land in the district, the hut was built by George Neeld who was soon joined by his brothers Joseph, Ernest and Harry and his father Fred Neeld – one of the early colonists who later became a pioneer of the Wyalong goldfields.

Wyalong Museum Old Wyalong Court House, 169 Neeld Street, Wyalong (02) 6972 2117

The Wyalong Court House was built in the early 1900s and displays the Federation style. The building exemplifies everything that was new to architecture at the time and is typical of country court houses designed by Walter Liberty Vernon (the Government Architect of the day).

The museum presents a broad spectrum of exhibits illustrating the growth of the town and district over the past century.


In 2012, the town of Boring in Oregon USA, cemented a relationship with the Perth and Kinross village of Dull, Scotland, in "a pair for the ages".

State Forests, Reserves & National Parks

The 25 State Forests, National Parks and Reserves in Bland Shire, are a great place for a drive or bike ride. These areas, including Lake Cowal, are excellent for bird and wildlife watching, mountain biking, bushwalking, panoramic views, breathtaking sunsets and picnics.

Main tree species within the area are Kurrajong, Cypress Pine, Mallee, Ironbark, Box, Belah, Wyalong Wattle and Wilga.

Bland Shire is also home to a range of unique wildflowers. Explore our spectacular flora, including some rare orchids. The best time to see the flowers is during our warmer months.

Bland Shire is home to a variety of native fauna species including water fowls, red and grey kangaroos, echidnas, goannas, possums, bats and the Malleefowl.

Fossicking

Bland Shire Council is one of four new councils to be declared fossicking districts, taking the total number of districts to 63 across 28 local government areas. The districts cover more than 9.3 million ha. (11.6% of the state) – the largest area ever in NSW.

Fossicking can be carried out on land in NSW that is deemed lawful, provided participants obtain permission from land owners and key stakeholders. Fossicking remains prohibited in National Parks.

Fossickers must comply with all relevant legislation including obtaining a permit to fossick. Visit the West Wyalong Visitor Information Centre to obtain a map of fossicking areas within the Bland Shire.

The Wetlands *Neeld Street, Wyalong*

This carefully designed passive recreation area has helped ease drainage problems in the area to facilitate the collection of run-off water from the town. It's a primary water source for all parks, gardens and recreation facilities in West Wyalong, helping to drought-proof key community facilities for several years.

The Wetlands' was developed on a pre-existing bird and wildlife sanctuary which has been reinvigorated to attract vast and rare species of birdlife, which are protected from vermin by a land island, purposely built in the middle of the facility. The initiative has already achieved success with rare magpies and geese settling in the area.

Golden Perch fish stocks were released into the waters of 'The Wetlands' to add to the variety of wildlife.

Wiradjuri Country

Wiradjuri history in the Bland Shire is diverse and vast. The area has several places with cultural significance. Wiradjuri means "people of the three rivers" these being the Lachlan, Macquarie and Murrumbidgee rivers.

Aboriginal occupation of Bland Shire is evidenced by archaeological finds, oral and recorded history. Echoes of the past are visible in the landscape once you know where to look. Some locations are named using Wiradjuri language.



In fact, Wyalong is a corruption of the word "Waaylang" meaning hard-shelled nut.
Aboriginal history is a shared history belonging to all Australians. We should all be proud in having the oldest living culture in the world.

Morning Sunrise, Afternoon Sunsets and Bright Stars at Night


Anywhere in the Bland Shire you can enjoy the bright, sparkly stars at night with the sounds of nature and no glare from city lights or noisy traffic.

Gold Trails

From the discovery of Australia's first payable gold at Ophir in 1851 and several years after, the history of New South Wales was dominated by the feverish rush to find gold – the splendid triumphs and bitter disappointments, the 'mateship' of the original diggers and the impact gold discoveries had on rural societies and economies.

Bland Shire Council is a member of the Gold Trails that link 17 Local

Government Areas and two National Parks and Wildlife Services sites located in the Lachlan Fold Belt, the main geographical region for gold discovery in NSW. It stretches from Hill End in the north to Kiandra in the south, Yass in the east to Forbes, West Wyalong and Weethalle in the west.

Stay in any of our towns and villages and travel the South-Western Gold Trail or the Newell Gold Trail to see the stories of those who won the gold and those who stole the gold, brought to life.



In 1949, well known Australian artist Russell Drysdale painted West Wyalong's main street at dusk, sketched from outside Tattersalls Hotel.

On the spot of his sketch for the now iconic 'West Wyalong' painting stands a celebration of his easel in bronze, together with an interpretive panel located on the corner of Main and Monash Streets.



Barmedman

This town, with accommodation, a truck stop, general store, craft shop and bowling club is just a 32km/25min drive on Goldfields Way from West Wyalong.

For a cuppa and a treat made with special care, visitors are encouraged to stop at the Barmedman Craft Shop or if you need your daily bread, milk and newspaper, the Post Office General Store is open till 5:00pm most days. They also prepare home-cooked meals ready for on the go.

Barmedman boasts a mineral swimming pool that originates from the flooding of goldmines by an underground stream in the 1880s. The large pool is run by locals, and situated on a four-hectare reserve looking out over the bush.

The water is said to have health giving properties. Entry is by donation and

with a BBQ, changing and camping facilities, this is a lovely spot to spend the day. Swimming season starts in mid October and runs until the end of March.

On the third Saturday in October, the local community hosts the biggest annual event, the Barmedman Modified Tractor Pull. See tuned-up tractors pull weighted sleds, enjoy food stalls, country markets and rides for the kids. The engines of the crazy tractors scream and powerful exhausts flame into the night sky as darkness falls.

Mirrool

Mirrool is a vibrant village nestled just off the Newell Highway, 47km south of West Wyalong. The village is best known for the annual Mirrool Silo Kick, a unique and hotly contested competition to kick a football clear over the huge grain silos. The Silo Kick is held on the second Saturday in October.

Call into the charming old-style Mirrool Royal Hotel, meet the locals, learn their nicknames and experience country hospitality at its best. There is a shady park with a great kids play area and a free camp site with showers and BBQ facilities. There is a small charge to gain access to power.

Wander back in time through the 'Memories of Mirrool' museum located close to the free camp area and take a photo of the 'Horsing Around' 3D interactive mural on the RFS Shed wall. The mural forms part of the Bland Shire Art Trail.

Naradhan

Naradhan is located 127km north west from West Wyalong in the Bland LGA. Naradhan is a close-knit community with high environmental values and rich agricultural heritage. It is known as a sheep grazing and winter cropping region.

The fully restored Historic Naradhan Woolshed, built in 1888 (seen from the main road) is one of the last great woolsheds in the region.

Tallimba

Tallimba is a quaint agricultural village situated 35km south west of West Wyalong. Surrounded by rich farmland, Tallimba is mainly focused on sheep grazing and winter cropping.

The community hub is the Tallimba Inn, standing across from the public park, which has public toilets, BBQ facilities, shelter area, basketball court and War Memorial.

Malleefowl are found in the area, so please drive safely and keep an eye out. You could be one of the few lucky ones to spot a Malleefowl in the wild.

Ungarie

Ungarie is located 42km north west of West Wyalong on the road to Lake Cargelligo. The town has a wonderful open air swimming pool and is home to the 'The Big Footy' - a large fibreglass Sherrin football in Bing Wallder Park that pays tribute to the Daniher family. Born and raised in Ungarie, Terry, Neale, Anthony and Chris Daniher are the only set of four brothers to play together in a VFL/AFL premiership match.

Visitors can stay at the Central Hotel, Ungarie Pines Motel or self-contained caravan site at the showgrounds which also has a free dump point.

A delicious meal at the Central Hotel or Bowling Club is a must, making the visit worthwhile.

Ungarie's War Memorial Park has 44 war murals painted by Simon White and a rotating world globe, depicting theatres of war where Ungarie men and women have served.

While in Ungarie, pop into the Ungarie Dugout Room which is located in the Memorial Hall.

Ungarie hosts one of the best agricultural shows in September. Sheep grazing and winter cropping remain the major industries.

Weethalle

Weethalle is best known for its silo art painted by Heesco and forms part of the Bland Art Trail. The artwork represents the heart of the village and surrounding area.



Weethalle is located 58km west of West Wyalong on the Mid Western Highway.

The Whistle Stop, located in the former railway station offices, is a perfect setting for a Devonshire tea.

Find the red door in the main street of Weethalle and enter a very relaxed space. Fat Bob and the Blonde offers good coffee, comfortable seating, handmade items and excellent company.

Don't forget to visit Weethalle's museum or to try a classic Aussie meal at the Road Kill Grillz. Accommodation can be found at the Royal Hotel or the Travellers Rest Motel. Campers are also welcome at the showgrounds.

Not to be missed is the annual Weethalle Show held in August.

Barmedman Mineral Pool Nobbys Road, Barmedman

This large mineral swimming pool is run by locals and situated on a four-hectare reserve looking out over the bush, with BBQ and changing facilities. The water is said to have health giving properties. Barmedman Mineral Pool is 32km/25 minute drive from West Wyalong.





Green Corridor Walking and Cycling Track

Visitors are welcome to undertake passive recreation activities such as bushwalking, cycling and birdwatching along the Green Corridor track. The 4.4km track starts at The Wetlands and heads west through Cooinda Reserve past the RSL Memorial Walk into McCann Park. If you feel energetic, continue the walk from McCann Park through Lions Park and past the sale yards all the way to West Wyalong Golf Club. Part of the track is seasonal, as it forms part of a water course. Please do not use the area when wet!

Kids Activities

Any kid will enjoy the parks and safe play equipment in the Bland Shire or splash in the pools in Barmedman, West Wyalong or Ungarie. The villages also have a mobile skate park or test your wheels at the West Wyalong Skate Park.

Tivoli Theatre

The Tivoli Theatre is named after its predecessor. The first Tivoli Cinema was located in West Wyalong's Main Street. It was taken down after significant damage and never rebuilt. The historic Masonic Hall has now been refurbished to incorporate a cinema and community theatre.
