
A Day Trip to Tallimba

Tallimba is a quaint agricultural village surrounded by rich farmland. Tallimba's main focus is sheep grazing and winter cropping.


Sports enthusiasts are well catered for with various facilities, including tennis and cricket grounds, fostering active lifestyles within the community.

Re-awakening Aboriginal Place Names


Tallimba Wiradjuri Name: Dhalymbang

Meaning: Hard Stone Axe

An initiative of the Riverina Local Land Services, West Wyalong

Local Aboriginal Land Council and Bland Shire Council.

The Reawakening of Aboriginal Place Names gives communities the opportunity to unlock past stories, preserve traditions and provide a sense of belonging and identity. The signage was painted by the very talented artist Kheely Turner, a proud Wiradjuri and Ngiyampaa woman.



Tallimba Community Hall

Tallimba Public School

Tallimba Inn and Park

Across from the Inn is the public park, which has amenities and BBQ facilities, play equipment and 1/2 court basketball court. Each Anzac Day Tallimba holds a remembrance service in the park, bringing the community together.
